
FIRST PENANCE, FIRST EUCHARIST, CONFIRMATION:


<u>Gospel</u> - Jesus asked the disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter replied, "You are the Christ".

NOT HIRED, BUT CHOSEN

When a company is recruiting for a top management position the process is detailed and thorough. No company wants to take a chance on a person who is anything other than the best available. Contrast this with today's Gospel account. Jesus first questions his disciples. Who do people say Jesus is? They give him several answers. Then he asks them who they say he is. It is impulsive, big-hearted Peter who exclaims, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God"). Think of Peter for a moment: a good Jew, but almost certainly illiterate and a fisherman by trade. Nevertheless, Jesus saw not only what Peter was, but what he could become. He saw into the heart and mind of this man and said, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church". The beginning of our Church lay in the hands of this one man and his fellow disciples. With the authority of God and the power of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, Jesus promised that ultimate evil would never prevail against it. Nevertheless, the Church is made up of flawed human beings who sometimes fail as followers of Jesus. We must never forget that even Peter himself, after Jesus chose him as "the rock," failed spectacularly by denying his Lord three times. When we fail, we should not walk away but strive even more to live a faithful Christian life.

The Alexander-Scott "School Choice Now Act" provides one-time, emergency funding for scholarship-granting organizations in each state; and provides permanent dollar-for-dollar federal tax credits for contributions to scholarship granting organizations.

As the Senate prepares its next aid bill, ask your Senators that the next COVID relief package include the "School Choice Now Act" to provide immediate assistance to families through federallyfunded scholarships.

Father Mickiewicz was ordained on May 26, 1962. His first assignment was Parochial Vicar at Blessed Sacrament Parish in Trenton. He served as Parochial Vicar at Our Lady of Mt. Virgin Parish, Middlesex; St.Augustine of Canterbury, Kendall Park; St. Anthony of Padua, Port Reading and St. Matthias, Somerset. He served as pastor at St. Ann's in Hampton and was the founding pastor at S. John Neumann, Califon and served there from 1985 to 2012.

St. Monica and St. Augustine; Mother and Son - An Unlikely Happy Ending

On some level, many of us have at least heard about Sts. Augustine and Monica. Augustine was born to an upper-class family around the year 354 in what is now modern-day Algeria. His father, Patricius, was a pagan, though years later he converted to Christianity on his deathbed. His mother, Monica, was a devout Christian and raised Augustine in the Faith, though he abandoned his Faith for many years. As a young man, Augustine began a long-term affair with a woman. They never married and their relationship led to the birth of their son Adeodatus. In Latin the name meant "by God given" or "gift of God." Despite the deep faith of his mother and his Christian upbringing, he abandoned the Faith of his childhood and became a Manichean. Monica was utterly destroyed. But she never let go of the hope that someday her prodigal son would return to God. She unceasingly prayed for him many years.

Augustine was a very intelligent man. He eventually took a position teaching rhetoric in Milan. This experience led him to have more engagement and connection with Christian literature and other believers.

One hot summer day in 386, Augustine heard a childlike voice calling him to "take up and read." He took this as a divine command, picked up the Bible, and opened to read the following: "Let us conduct ourselves properly as in the day, – not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and licentiousness, not in rivalry and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provisions for the desires of the flesh. " -Romans 13:13-14. Augustine was cut to the heart. The conversion his mother prayed for all those years now began in great haste.

At the next Easter Vigil, both Augustine and his son were baptized by St. Ambrose.

The radical conversion of Augustine led to him eventually becoming one of the most profound spiritual teachers and bishops of Western Christianity. To this day, he is one of the most beloved and prolific writers and thinkers in the history of Catholicism.

Lessons We Can Learn from St. Monica

Saint Monica teaches us hope and persistence when life and situations look most bleak. She hoped against all odds for the conversion of her wayward son. She persisted against all reason, believing her son would someday convert. She never gave up or stopped praying and fasting. And more importantly, she never stopped loving her son even when he went against everything she instilled in him as a child.

Lessons We Can Learn from St. Augustine

While Augustine was raised in a devout Christian home, he probably knew a lot about Jesus but did not have a personal relationship with Him. It was not until many years later as an adult that he had a personal encounter with the Living God. That experience propelled a radical conversion. The story of Augustine's whole life reminds us that no one is outside the mercy of Jesus Christ. There is no person too great a sinner for the healing and forgiveness of Jesus.
