Therefore, arrangements are to be made at least one year in advance and before any social plans are finalized.

FIRST PENANCE, FIRST EUCHARIST, CONFIRMATION: Though immediate preparation is given to children before receiving these sacraments, it is expected that children receive a Christian education within their family life, through formal religious education classes, and by attending Sunday worship services.


PASTORAL CARE OF THE SICK: Arrangements for Communion Calls to the sick at home may be made by calling the Parish Office.

<u>First Reading</u> - In a vision Isaiah is called to be a messenger for the Lord of hosts. Isaiah responds, "Send me!".

<u>Second Reading</u> - Paul reminds us of the gospel he preached through which we are saved, if we believe it. <u>Gospel</u> - Jesus directs Simon to take his boat into deep water for a miraculous catch of fish. Simon and his partners leave all to follow Jesus.

Reflection

Peter knew fish, but Jesus knew his mission. The marvelous catch of fish brought everything into focus for Peter, who had already spent some time with Jesus and had witnessed other miracles. But now he saw anew. He fell to his knees, suddenly aware of who Jesus was and who he was—or was not. Who Peter was and what he lacked did not matter. Who Jesus was and what he asked mattered absolutely. Peter knew this, and he knew that this was it. Along with his fishing partners, James and John, Peter left his boats and his fishing and followed Jesus. Today we hear from one last apostle, who was as surprised as anyone could be about his calling—Paul. He does not set forth the story of his calling but rather the mission for which he was called.

These stories of the beginnings of a new life for Isaiah, for Simon and his shipmates, and for Paul, all witness to an undeniable sense of the mystery of God and of each individual's sense of inadequacy. But above all, these stories communicate God's abiding grace, which makes their new life and mission possible.

A LETTER FROM THE BISHOP

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We are celebrating our 40th Anniversary as a diocese this year. What a great accomplishment to have had forty years of serving Christ and making His kingdom present here in our four beautiful counties in Central New Jersey.

Forty has long been an important number in Scripture; it is mentioned over a thousand times throughout the Bible. We know some of them quite well. Moses' 40 years in the desert and 40 days on Mount Sinai communing with God and receiving the Ten Commandments, Jonah's 40 days preaching Nineveh to repent, and of course, Jesus' 40 days and nights fasting in the desert. All of these 40's representing periods of testing and temptation.

I think that we, too, have passed difficult tests in our 40 years as a diocese. I am so grateful to you for your significant contributions to making our diocesan Church robust and moving forward. We certainly have had our challenges. The past two years, the coronavirus has impacted all of us and affected our daily living in so many ways. The Story of St. Bernadette and Our Lady of Lourdes



February 11 is the feast day of <u>Our Lady of Lourdes</u>, one of the most famous apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary that took place in southern France. On this day in 1858 a young, poor girl named <u>Bernadette Soubirous</u> was out collecting firewood with her sister and another friend near a grotto when she saw a vision of a lovely lady. In the words of St. Bernadette, "I raised my head and looked towards the grotto. I saw a Lady dressed in white, wearing a white dress, a blue girdle and a yellow rose on each foot, the same color as the chain of her Rosary." In the vision Our Lady was praying the <u>rosary</u>.

Bernadette reluctantly told her parents of the apparition, and in response they forbade her from going back to the grotto. A few days later, on February 14th, Bernadette was permitted to return to the

grotto, and again the Lady appeared to her. This happened again on February 18th. On this third visit the Lady asked Bernadette to come back to the grotto every day for the next two weeks.

At these subsequent visits the Lady (who had not yet identified herself as the Blessed Virgin Mary) asked for a chapel to be built on the grounds, for Bernadette to pray for the conversion of sinners, and for her to drink the spring water that was revealed to her at the grotto.

Word of these apparitions spread rapidly and caused quite a stir in town. In response, Bernadette was detained, interrogated, and harassed by the civil authorities as if she were a common criminal. The villagers, however, came to her rescue and demanded that the child be released. Through all these difficulties that came to her because of the apparitions, Bernadette was given an interior strength: "There was something in me that enabled me to rise above everything. I was tackled from all sides, but nothing mattered and I was not afraid."

Many of the townspeople believed that Mary was appearing to Bernadette, and they came down in large numbers to the grotto to pray. The spring that the Lady asked Bernadette to drink from quickly revealed itself to be blessed water with miraculous healing properties.

On March 25th, the Feast of the Annunciation, the Lady appeared at the grotto again, this time identifying herself as the Immaculate Conception.

"With her two arms hanging down, she raised her eyes and looked up at the sky, and it was then that she told me, joining her hands together now at the height of her breast, that she was the Immaculate Conception. Those were the last words she ever said to me."

As for herself, Bernadette suffered much, not only through physical suffering due to her chronic poor health, but also through the jealousy and suspicion from others because she was given the grace of visits from the Blessed Mother. This proved true the words Our Lady spoke to Bernadette at the grotto, "I do not promise to make you happy in this world, but in the other."

Four years after Our Lady of Lourdes appeared to St. Bernadette, the local bishop ruled that the apparitions were authentic. St. Bernadette eventually entered a religious house where she continued to suffer physically, uniting her suffering to Christ, and died at an early age.
