Therefore, arrangements are to be made at least one year in advance and before any social plans are finalized.

FIRST PENANCE, FIRST EUCHARIST, CONFIRMATION: Though immediate preparation is given to children before receiving these sacraments, it is expected that children receive a Christian education within their family life, through formal religious education classes, and by attending Sunday worship services.

### **Twenty-Ninth Sunday** in Ordinary Time October 16, 2022

*I lift up my eyes toward the mountains;* whence shall help come to me? My help is from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

<u>First Reading</u> - As long as Moses' hands were kept uplifted, Joshua and his men had the better part of the battle with Amalek.

**Second Reading** - Remain faithful; proclaim the word; be persistent whether it is convenient or not. **Gospel** - God will secure the rights of the chosen who call out day and night.

The gospel theme today is "Persistency in Prayer": pray without ceasing, pray without losing heart.

Jesus tells his disciples: pray always without becoming weary. And today he tells us a parable, the parable of the corrupt judge., who says, 'While it is true that I neither fear God nor respect any human being, because this widow keeps bothering me. I shall deliver a just decision for her lest she finally come and strike me."

The Lord said, "Pay attention to what the dishonest judge says. I tell you, he will see to it that justice is done for them speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Yes, God's love never fails and God will love us to the end, and even more into eternity. Yes, God is faithful, but what of our own faith? Shall we be ready to answer on that day as Peter: "To whom shall we go, Lord, for you alone have the words of eternal life."

Persistence in prayer is not to be understood as trying to change God's mind, as if God was unwilling to help us in the first place.

It's we who need to change... "Not my will but thy will

His will is our peace. His Garden is our delight. His death on the cross is his gift of faith and a love that heals and saves us all.

And will he find a like faith and love coming from us in return for the love he poured out for us?

#### THE FIVE FINGER PRAYER

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On October 23, World Mission Sunday, we join Catholics worldwide in this annual Eucharistic celebration for the Missions of the Church.

Pope Francis reflects on this year's theme: "You shall be My witnesses" (Acts 1:8). He emphasizes the call to every Christian to bear witness to Christ, to participate in a mission of universal evangelization, and to seek strength and guidance from the Holy Spirit.

Beginning in 1822, the universal fund of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith provided some \$7 million in help to the new and growing Churches in the United States. ### **5 STEPS TO SAINTHOOD**

**First**, the person's local bishop investigates their life by gathering information from witnesses of their life and any writings they may have written. If the bishop finds them to be worthy of being a saint, then he submits the information that he gathered to the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints.

**Second**, the Congregation for the Causes of Saints can choose to reject the application or accept it and begin their own investigation of the person's life. If the application is accepted, the person may be called *Servant of God*.

**Third**, if the Congregation for the Causes of Saints approves of the candidate, they can choose to declare that the person lived a life heroically virtuous life. This isn't a declaration that the person is in heaven, but that they pursued holiness while here on earth. If this is indeed found to be the case, the person may be called *Venerable*.

**Fourth**, to be recognized as someone in heaven requires that a miracle has taken place through the intercession of that person. The miracle is usually a healing. The healing has to be instantaneous, permanent, and complete while also being scientifically unexplainable. Miracles have to be first verified as scientifically unexplainable by a group of independent doctors, then the person is approved by a panel of theologians, and then the final approval lies with the pope. If this is the case, a person is declared a *blessed*.

Note: Besides the number of miracles attributed to them, the difference between is a blessed and a saint is that the scope of devotion for a blessed is narrower – usually limited to a specific group of people or a particular region of the world while a saint is held up for devotion for the universal Church.
