PARISH REGISTRATION: Our parish welcomes new members to our faith community. Catholic persons new to our area must complete a registration form and be interviewed by the pastor. "Jesus said, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself take up his cross, and following me."

<u>First Reading</u> - In this particularly poetic passage, Jeremiah complains that while teaching the Lord's word, he is subjected to insults and derision. He determines to remain silent, but he cannot because the desire to speak the Lord's name is "like a fire burning in my heart."

<u>Second Reading</u> - Paul tells the Christians to make sacrifices to avoid the trappings of the times, and to do God's will.

<u>Gospel</u> - Jesus tries to make his disciples realize that by following him, they will endure suffering, degradation, and death. He tells them that they must deny themselves and take up the cross in order to be his disciples.

Reflection

Have you ever thought about how difficult it would be to be a prophet? Prophets often spoke bluntly, whether addressing the people or even God. Take Jeremiah today. He accuses God of seducing and overpowering him, making him speak a word that has led to his ridicule and persecution. He was even thrown down a cistern and left to die because of his preaching! Jeremiah confesses he has no choice. When he refuses to speak God's word, he experiences a fire burning in his heart, consuming his bones.

Most likely, each of us at some point in our lives has taken a stand against popular opinion and the cost of drawing near to the living God can take us down a path we would rather not go. Peter foresaw this coming when Jesus began to speak of the suffering that lay ahead. Jesus spoke about taking up the cross, losing one's life, or, in Paul's words to the Romans, becoming "a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God."

God's plan for us is the transformation and renewal of our minds and hearts according to the pattern of God's Son Jesus. This transformation comes about when we "offer ourselves as a living sacrifice," seeking to discern and do God's will as Jesus did. Self-offering may lead to our following Jesus on the way: finding life by losing it for the sake of others, and coming to know the living God as purifying fire, life-giving water, and nourishing food for spirit. Carrying our cross and denying ourselves the pleasures of the world often brings about sorrowful emotions. It is hard and harsh, depressing and negative. Perhaps the challenge of "carrying our cross" is more in how we view the obligation rather than the task itself.

Pray the Rosary daily

The Catholic Church celebrates the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary on September 8, nine months after the December 8 celebration



of her Immaculate Conception as the child of Saints Joachim and Anne.

The circumstances of the Virgin Mary's infancy and early life are not directly recorded in the Bible, but other documents describing the circumstances of her birth are cited by some of the earliest Christian writers.

The "Protoevangelium of James,", describes Mary's father Joachim as a wealthy member of one of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. Joachim was deeply grieved, along with his wife Anne, by their childlessness. "He called to mind Abraham," the early Christian writing says, "that in the last day God gave him a son Isaac."

Joachim and Anne began to devote themselves extensively and rigorously to prayer and fasting, initially wondering whether their inability to conceive a child might signify God's displeasure with them.

As it turned out, however, the couple were to be blessed even more abundantly than Abraham and Sarah, as an angel revealed to Anne when he appeared to her and prophesied that all generations would honor their future child: "The Lord has heard your prayer, and you shall conceive, and shall bring forth, and your seed shall be spoken of in all the world." After Mary's birth, according to the Protoevangelium of James, Anne "made a sanctuary" in the infant girl's room, on account of the special holiness of the child. The same writing records that when she was one year old, her father "made a great feast, and invited the priests, and the scribes, and the elders, and all the people of Israel."

"And Joachim brought the child to the priests and they blessed her, saying: 'O God of our fathers, bless this child, and give her an everlasting name to be named in all generations' .. And he brought her to the scribes, and they blessed her, saying: 'O God most high, look upon this child, and bless her with the utmost blessing, which shall be for ever."

The protoevangelium goes on to describe how Mary's parents, along with the temple priests, subsequently decided that she would be offered to God as a consecrated Virgin for the rest of her life, and enter a chaste marriage with the carpenter Joseph.

Saint Augustine described the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary as an event of historic significance, and as a prelude to the birth of Jesus Christ. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley."
